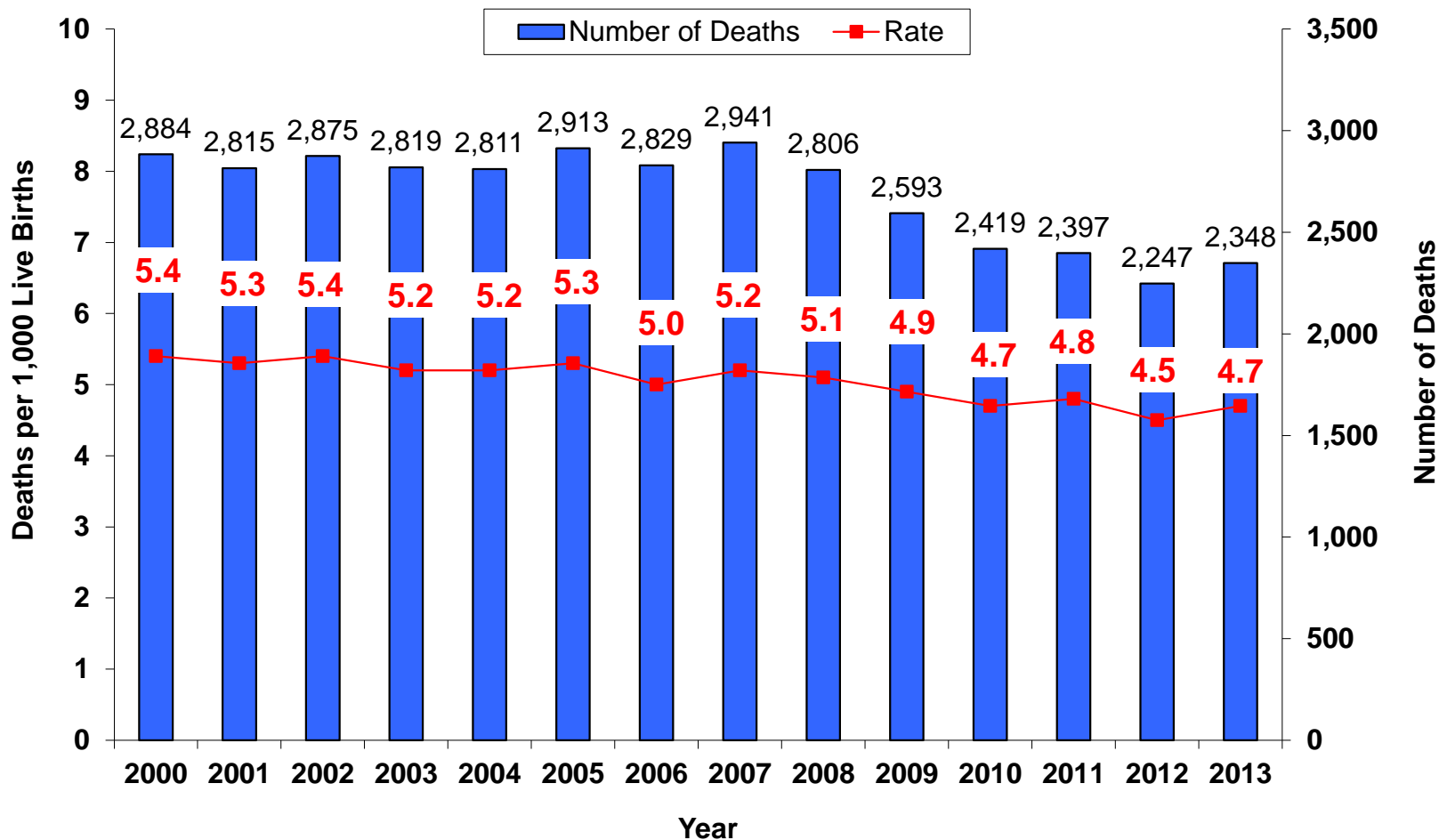

Infant Mortality Rate and Number of Deaths, 2000-2013

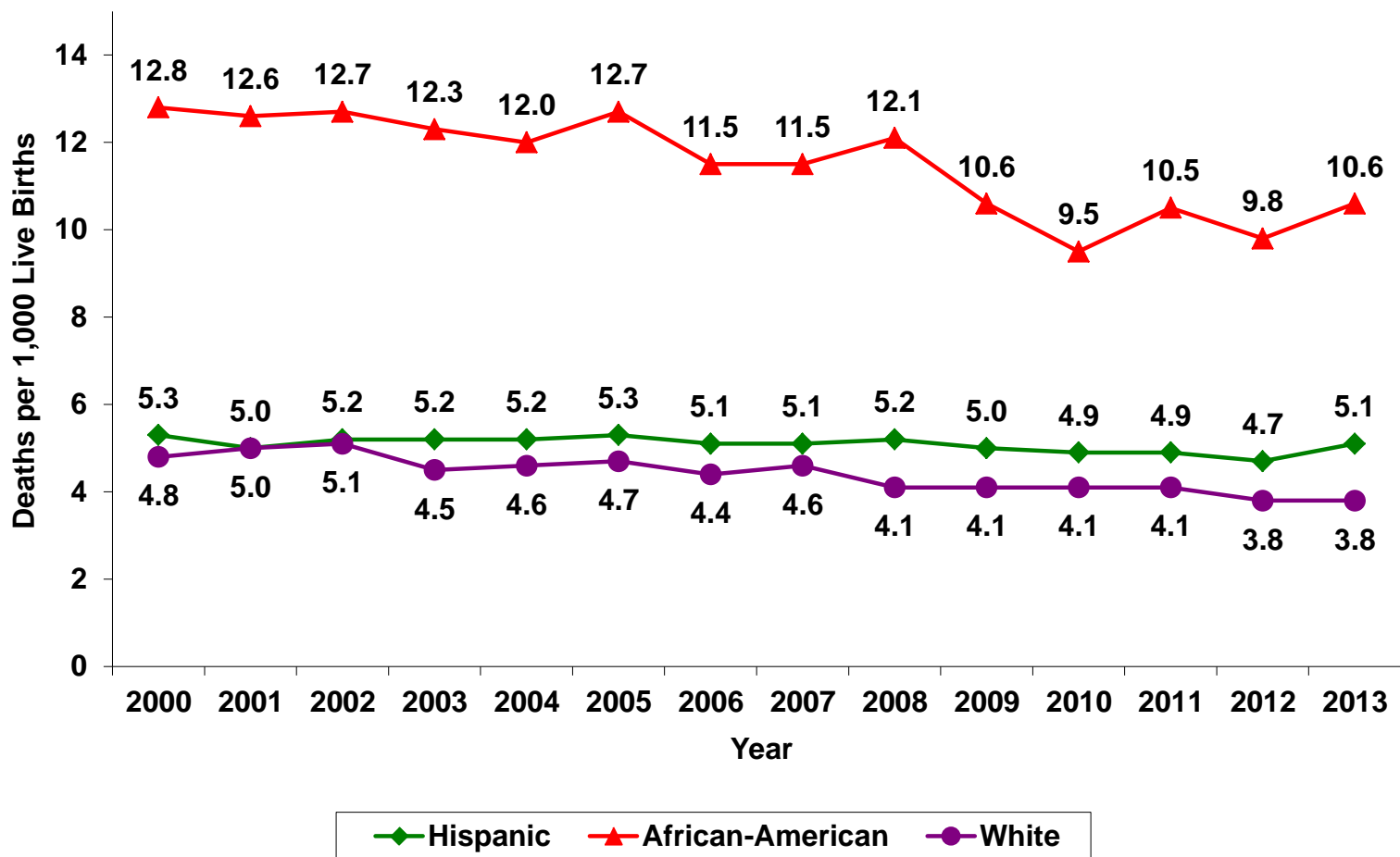

Infant Mortality Rate by Race/Ethnicity, 2000-2013

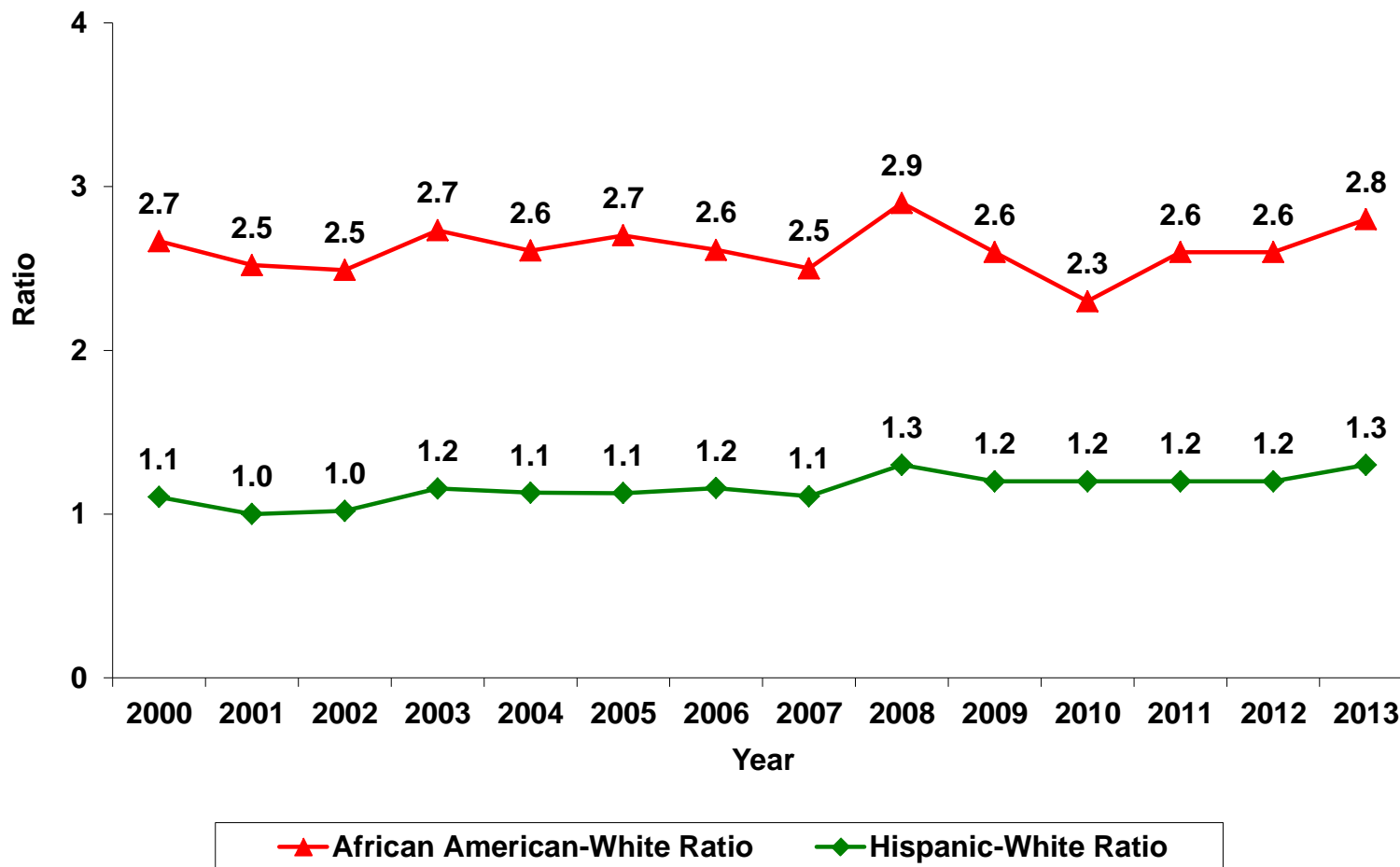

Black-White and Hispanic-White Infant Mortality Ratio, 2000-2013

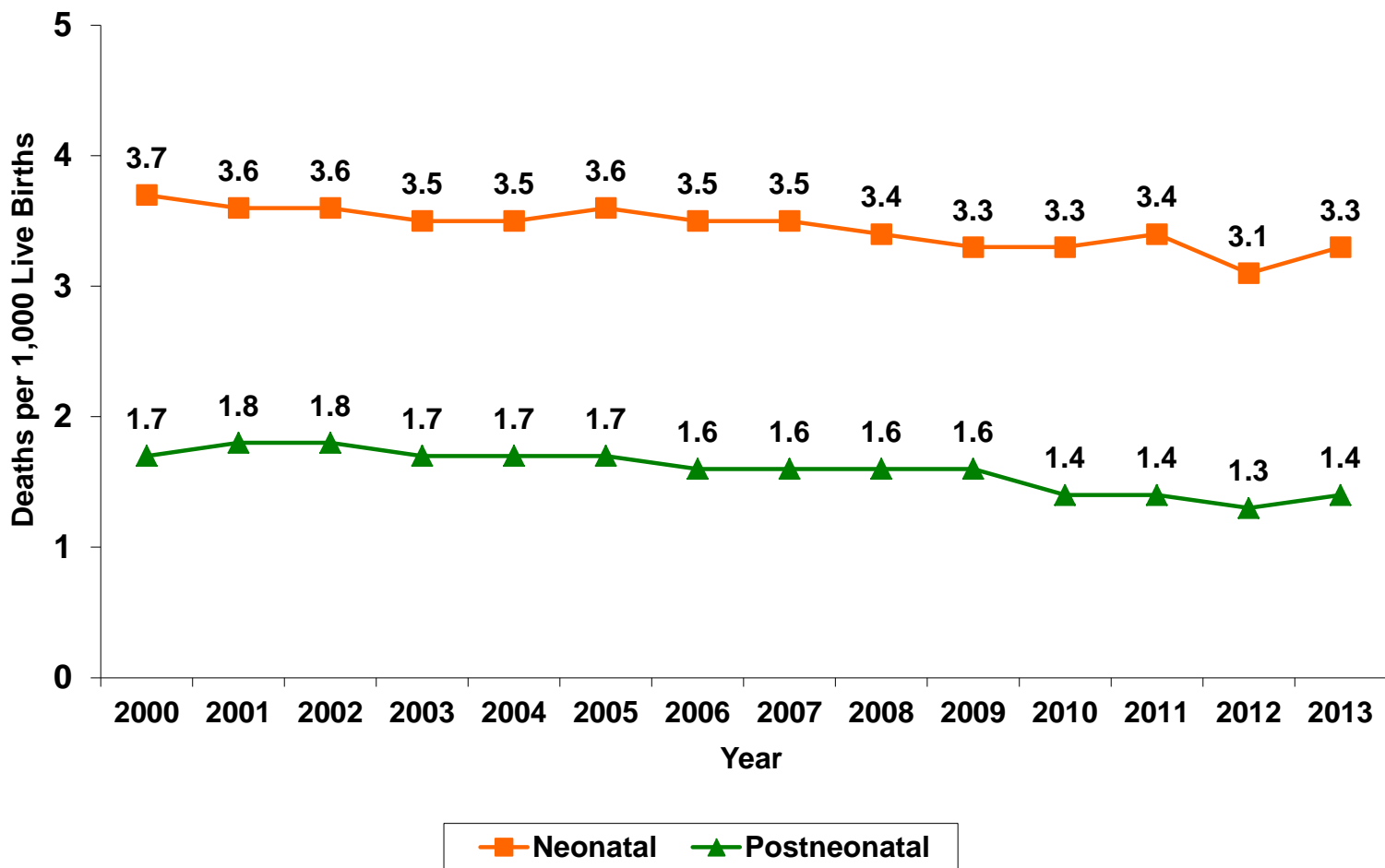

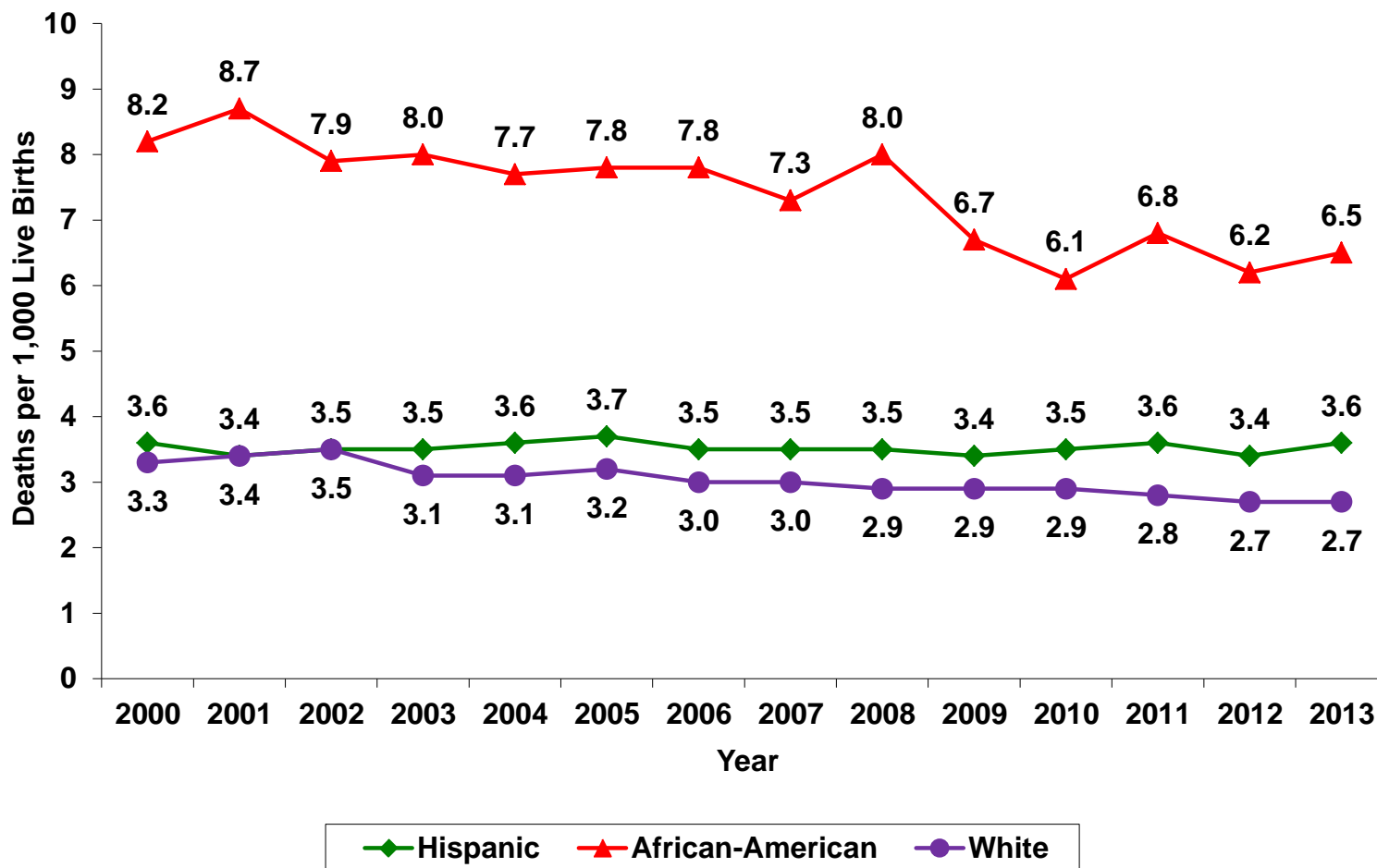
Neonatal and Postneonatal Mortality Rates per 1,000 Live Births, 2000-2013

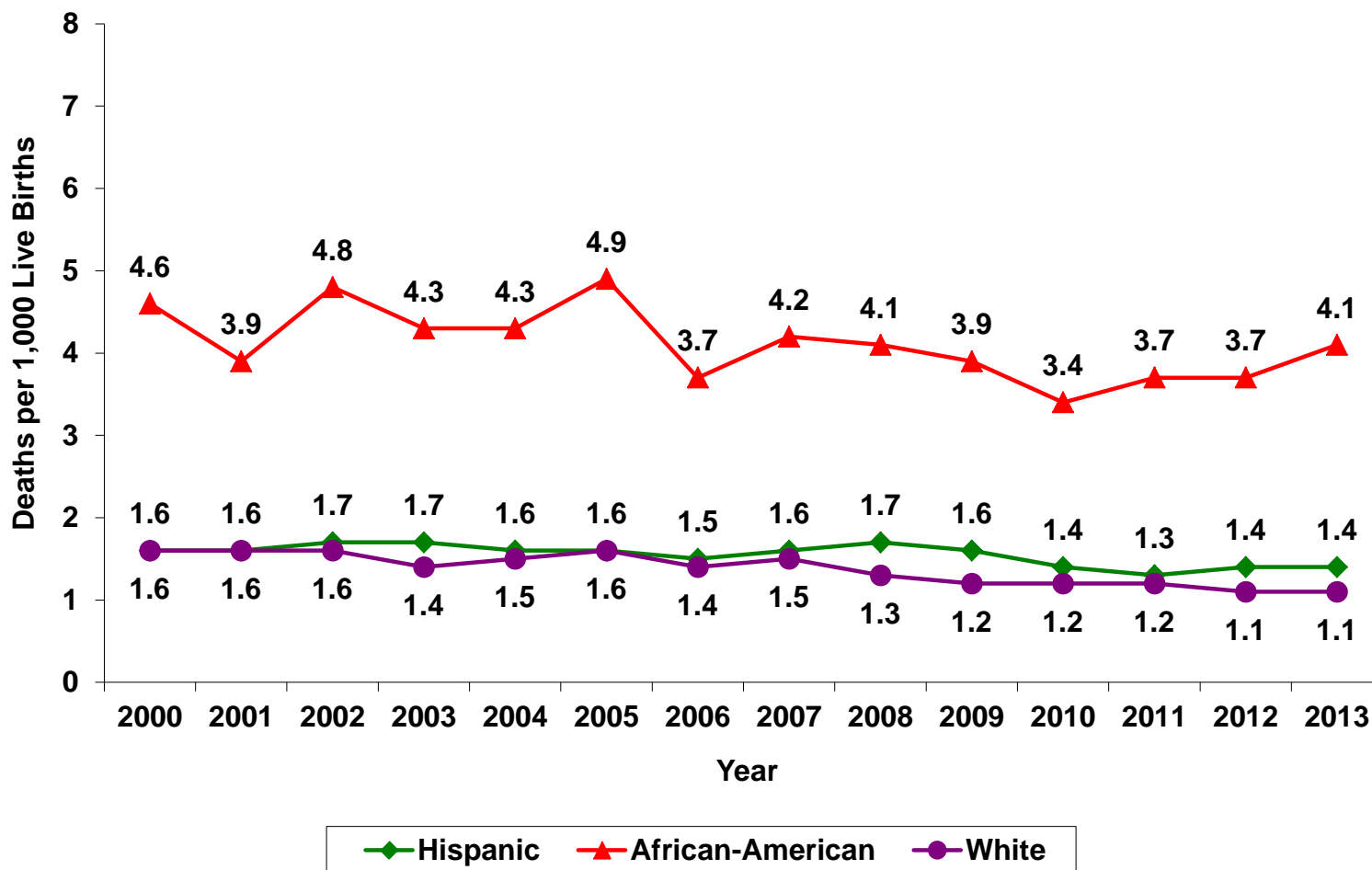
Neonatal Mortality Rates per 1,000 Live Births by Race/Ethnicity, 2000-2013

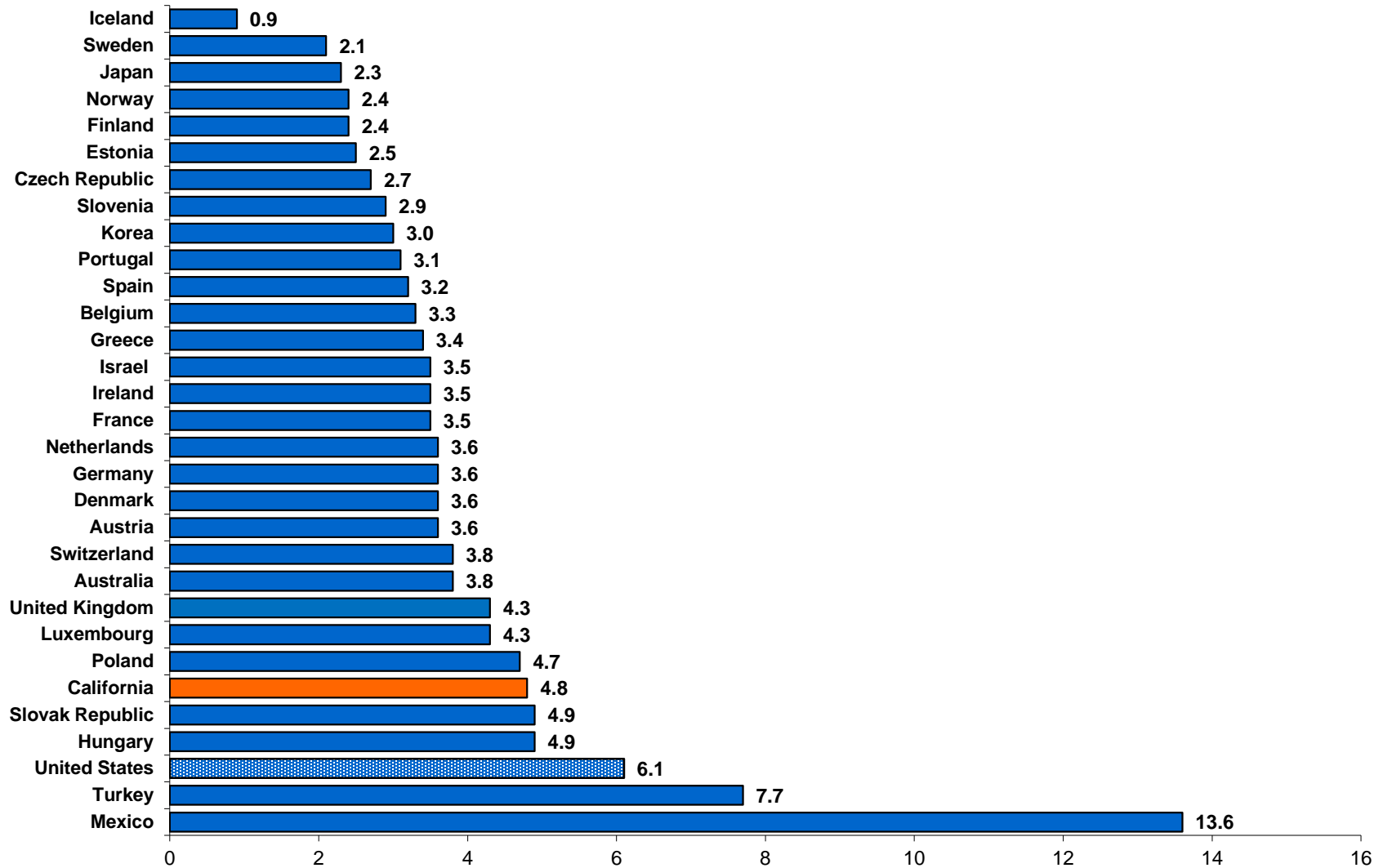
Postneonatal Mortality Rates per 1,000 Live Births by Race/Ethnicity, 2000-2013

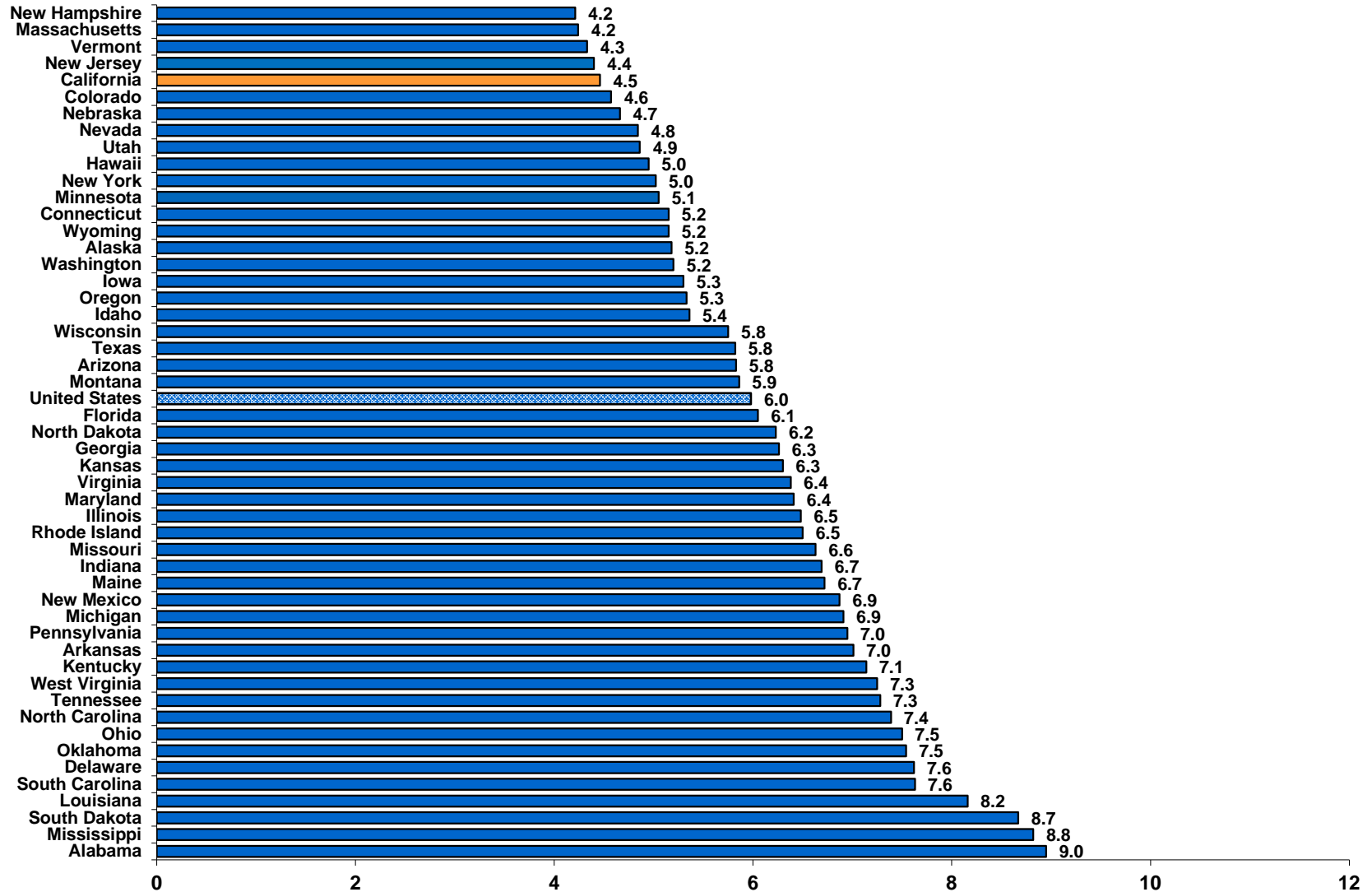
If California was an independent nation, it would have ranked 26th in infant mortality in the world in 2011. (The US ranked 29th.)

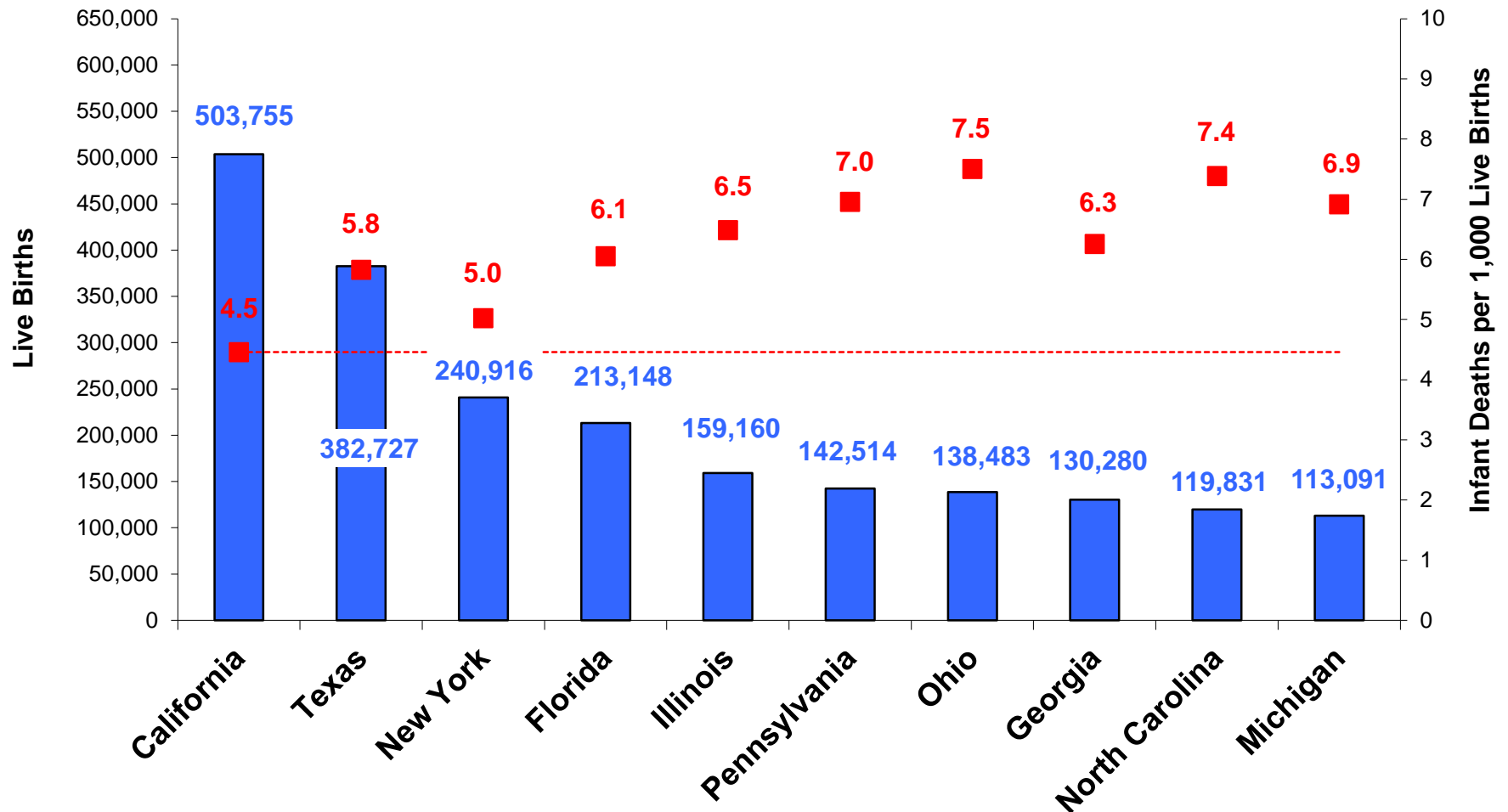


In 2012, California ranked 5th in state infant mortality rates.
